#### **COVID UPDATES FROM THE VILLAGE OFFICES:**

We will be reopening the village office beginning in July. PLEASE REMEMBER you can pay utility bills and register pets via mail and the security box located outside the main doors. If you're not sure if you need to come into the office for your transaction please call 715 778-5635.

<u>The Police Department</u> We will still be keeping the office door locked for security reasons. People will need to knock to gain entry. We will still be asking people to wear a mask in our office area as we do not have good fresh air flow. 778-5678.

#### **Construction Updates**

**Abatement** at the **OLD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL** will begin July 19th. Demolition is expected to start August 2nd and could last up to 6 weeks. Watch for trucks transporting debris north on Sabin, then west on First St. to Newman, then south on Newman along the truck route to Hwy 29. This should avoid congestion in the busiest part of downtown.

**EAU GALLE ROAD** is scheduled to begin July 12th when WE Energies begins relocating services. Construction should be starting August 2nd. Haas will start at Akers/Sabin corner and proceed toward the bridge, hopefully completing this section by Dam Days. They will, however, be working on all of Eau Galle Rd during this time. Unfortunately Eau Galle Rd will be closed for

Dam Days. Substantial completion is mid-October.

The Village has received many complaints about pet owners walking their dogs and not picking up af-

ter them. We have put up "doggie-doo" stations in the west parking lot at Handy Andy Park and at the start of the walking path tucked up next to a shrub. We can add more around town if we see these being used. It has been estimated that a single gram of dog waste can contain 23 million <u>fecal coliform bacteria</u>, which are known to cause cramps, diarrhea, intestinal illness, and serious kidney disorders in humans. Please do not leave your dog waste for others to step in!

## A FRIENDLY REMINDER FROM THE POLICE DEPT: ATV/UTV EQUIPMENT/RIDING LAWS

- Headlamp/Taillamp required when operating on road
- License Plates are required to be displayed on back
- Registration decal front half of ATV facing outward
- Headgear for all operators and passengers under 18 years of age
- ATV Safety certificate required for operators born on/ after January 1, 1988
- Speed for in town in 10 MPH
- No ATV/UTV traffic on McKay



Spring Valley Waterworks will be installing new water meters throughout the entire village. Our current meters are nearly 20 years old and technology has come a long way! The new Kamstrup meters will eliminate the need for a 2-week, hands-on water meter read; they are an AMR Drive-by System. The meters are more efficient, have a temperature detector for freezing conditions, and have consumption capabilities to detect leaks. We have contracted with HydroCorp to install everyone's meter. Hydro-Corp will begin the process of scheduling your install by sending a letter to each home and asking for a timeframe that works for you. If your appointment needs to be rescheduled because of a homeowner issue, you will be billed for a second appointment. Your meter must be accessible! Clear clutter from around the meter and if you have enclosed it, it will need to be exposed. It is your responsibility to make sure the valves feeding your meter are operable. Your meter should already be grounded. If it is not up to code at the time of your install it will be done for you and you will be charged on your September 30<sup>th</sup> bill. The cross-connection vacuum breaker will also be checked at this time. If you need the part, it will be installed and you will be charged for that as well. The project is expected to start in mid-late July and last 4-5 weeks. If you have any questions, please call Luann at the village office 715-778-5635.

- \$70 to reschedule an appointment
- \$15 to bring your grounding strap up to code
- \$5.50 to install a cross-connection vacuum breaker

Proper grounding strap installation should go **around** your meter. The new meters are composite so grounding through your meter would provide no continuity for your electrical ground. If you have a plastic water line from the street this does not apply to you.






# Home Repairs That Can Be Made With 0% Deferred CDBG Housing Loans

#### ELIGIBLE REPAIRS:

- Plumbing
- Electrical
- Water Heater
- Furnace
- Doors/Windows
- Interior Walls, Floors, Ceilings
- Roof
- Foundation Repairs
- Sewer/Water Laterals
- Well/Septic
- Modifications for Disabled Individuals



# Who Can Apply For 0% Loans?

•<u>LMI</u>\*<u>Homeowners</u>: 0% deferred loans may be made to eligible LMI homeowners to make needed home repairs. The loan does not need to be repaid to the *Village of Spring Valley* until the home is sold or is no longer the owner's primary residence. Loan amounts typically range from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

•LMI\* Homebuyer: 0% deferred loans may be made to eligible LMI homebuyers to assist with purchasing an existing home within the *Village of Spring Valley*. The loan is used to pay for up to half the down payment, and all reasonable closing costs. The loan does not need to be repaid to the local municipality until the home is sold or is no longer the owner's primary residence. Loan amounts typically range from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

•Loans to Landlords: 0% loans may be made to eligible landlords who agree to rent their units to LMI household\* for at least 5 years. The loan with Landlords are amortized and need to be repaid to the *Village of Spring Valley*. Loan amounts typically range from \$15,000 to \$20,000. Landlords who accept CDBG loans may not charge rents in excess of the prevailing, non-subsidized rents in the local municipality as defined by the CDBG Housing Program.

* <u>LMI Eligibility</u> : LMI refers to low-and moderate-income.
