Are you receiving your lottery and gaming credit on your property tax bill?

You may claim the credit if you were the owner on January 1, 2021 and used the property as your primary residence. The credit is not allowed on business property, rental units, land, garages, etc. A non-Wisconsin resident cannot claim this credit. If you qualify and there is not a lottery credit on your tax bill, forms are available at the village office. Due date is January 31, 2022, but PLEASE have them turned in before property tax bills are printed in November 2021. It will be much easier to process!

2021 PROPERTY TAX SEASON IS UPON US!! There are many calculations that go into figuring tax bills and we, as well as the school and county, are already preparing for December. Tax bills will be mailed

the beginning of December; by statute they must be mailed by December 15th. In order to claim real estate taxes on your 2021 tax return, payment must be made to the village office or postmarked by December 31st, 2021. Remember, whether you're making 1/2 or full payment, your first tax payment is made to Village of Spring Valley. Any payment made after January 31st should be made payable to Pierce County Treasurer and paid in the Treasurer's Office at Pierce County.

INTERESTED IN BEING ON THE VILLAGE

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME ENDS

Daylight savings time is coming to an end. Remember to set your clocks back one hour at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, November 7th. This is also a great time to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.





The Public Works Department will be flushing hydrants the week of October 4th thru October 8th. Remember to *check your water before washing clothes to prevent staining.* Residents with water softeners should also check the cycle time of their softeners so the unit does not regenerate during this time period. If your water appears dark or cloudy let it run until clear.

Notes about water and sewer accounts

Snowbirds: let us know when you leave and return so there is no delay in your water and sewer billing

<u>Telephone numbers</u>: please let us know when you have a change in your telephone number. Many people are going to cell phones only and it is hard to track those numbers.

<u>Moving in or out:</u> renters, landlords and property owners *please* notify the village office when you move in or out. This will ensure that the last bill you receive will be the correct billing and that you will not be held liable for someone else's water usage.

WINTER REMINDERS

~It's almost time to dig out the snow shovel and tune up the snow blower, which means it's also time to review snow removal and parking policies~

Village snowplowing and removal is scheduled at the discretion of the Director of Public Works. The Public Works Department will make every effort to clear the streets following a snow fall to help make them safe for motorists. The village is not responsible for anything damaged within the right-of-way. This includes, but not limited to, turf, mailboxes, flowers, gravel, and trees.



Pursuant to Section 38-150 of the Village Code of Ordinances, the owner, occupant or person in charge of any lot which fronts or adjoins a sidewalk shall keep the sidewalk clear of all snow and ice. If snow accumulates on a sidewalk due to natural means and/or by any other means, the sidewalk shall be cleared of all the accumulated snow and/or ice within 24 hours from the time the

snow ceases to accumulate on the sidewalk. Sidewalks are to be kept clear of snow and ice to a minimum of four feet in width. If ice has formed on a sidewalk in such a way that it cannot be removed, the owner, occupant or person in charge of the sidewalk shall keep the sidewalk sprinkled with sand and/or salt to permit safe travel by pedestrians.

If you fail to remove the snow and/or ice after you have been notified the village will do so at a minimum charge of \$100.00 per hour. Unpaid bills will be assessed to the property tax bill.

Please do NOT shovel or blow snow into the street. This creates a hazardous condition for motorists. In addition village ordinances prohibit this action and doing so may result in a fine.

Winter Parking restrictions will go into effect Monday November 1, 2021. There is no parking allowed on village streets between the hours of 2:00am-6:00am. Spring Valley Police Department will be issuing tickets to vehicles parked illegally during these hours, regardless of snowfall. Parking will be enforced every night between November 1st and March 31st. If you are experiencing mechanical difficulty or have overnight guests please contact the police department (715 778-5678) to avoid a ticket.

On October 31st from 5-7 pm Emmaus Church is hosting Trunk-Or-Treat where trick-or-treating is done from parked cars in the church parking lot.



Beware of Solicitation!

If someone is knocking on your door to sell something please ask them for their Direct Seller's Permit they received from the village office (also called a Solicitor's Permit), If you see someone going door-to-door in the village, please call the village office to verify they have a permit. Anyone selling to the general public must fill out an application and have a background check done by our village police department. This includes vacuum cleaner sales, meat dealers, driveway sealing services, roofing, food trucks etc. This will help ensure honesty and safety for all our residents.



Do you have old prescriptions and over the counter drugs you would like to get rid of?

The village has a secure container to dispose of them. Please bring meds in their original container or zip lock bag. Also accepting pet medications and sharps. The office is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday—Friday

2022 Dog and Cat Licensing

Per state law, all dogs over 5 months of age are to be vaccinated and licensed. Village ordinance requires this for cats as well. The fees are: neutered and spayed dogs and cats are \$20.00, intact are \$30.00. Please license your pets by April 1st, 2022 to avoid late fees and fines. Licensing forms will be included with your property tax bill. If you do not receive a tax bill, they can be found on the village website site at www.springvalleywi.com Vaccination clinics are held in January; watch for details.

Please note this rate increase is for water utility only and does not affect the sewer rates on your utility bill. Current and increased rate schedules are on the back of your utility bill. Below are some guiding points to use when reading your utility bill.

HOW TO READ YOUR UTILITY BILL. HAVE YOUR CURRENT UTILITY BILL IN FRONT OF YOU:

METER SIZE	<u>WATER</u>	<u>SEWER</u>	PUBLIC FIRE
5/8"	\$22.50	\$96.00	\$18.15
3/4"	\$22.50	\$102.11	\$18.15
1"	\$27.00	\$120.56	\$45.00

PER VOLUME CHARGE—WATER

First 20,000 gal- -4.10 per 1,000

Next 180,000 gal- -3.90 per 1,000

PER VOLUME CHARGE—SEWER

Each 1,000 gal. of water 5.00

Above is the start of the same table that is on the back of your utility bill. Residential and most businesses have a 5/8" meter so this is the line you're going to look at, forget about the 3/4" and 1" rows unless you know you have a larger meter. Your base fee for Public Fire is \$18.15, this is the first line of your utility bill. Let's look at the water charge. It is a combination of the base fee of \$22.50 + usage which is calculated at \$4.10/1000 gallons used up to 20,000 gallons. The usage number on the front of your utility bill will tell you how much water you drew through your meter. If your previous meter read was 762,000 (stated as 762) and your current meter read is 771,000 (stated as 771), that means you pulled 9,000 gallons of water into your home. $9 \times \$4.10 = \36.90 . Add this to the \$22.50 base fee and your water charge is \$59.40. The sewer usage is calculated on that same number as water usage. You've only got 1 meter in your home and whatever is coming in is going out! Sewer base fee is \$96.00 and usage is calculated at \$5/1000 gallons into the sanitary sewer system. $9 \times \$5 = \45.00 . Add this to the \$96.00 base fee and your sewer charge is \$141.00. If you add all three of those numbers, your total utility bill will be \$18.15 + \$59.40 + \$141.00 = \$218.55 per quarter which averages to \$72.85 per month.

Now lets look at the rate increase: Public fire increases to \$34.88. The base fee water goes to \$30.00 and usage goes to \$8.00/1000 gallons. There are no changes to the sanitary sewer figures. Using that same usage of 9,000 gallons, that same bill under the new rates would be \$34.88 + 102.00 + \$141.00 = \$277.88 per quarter which averages to \$92.63 per month.
